All hail the Queen of the box! Even though she has a brand-new series, **Claudia Winkleman** tells **buzz** why she's quitting her much-loved Strictly show to concentrate on baby number three

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Words Paul Simper Photographs John Wright HE LAST TIME **buzz** put mum-of-two and all-round good egg Claudia Winkleman on the cover she told us she didn't want another baby, she wanted a kitten. Today with no mewing fur ball in sight but a ginormous kicking tummy present before us under a loose-fitting Simeon Farrar T-shirt, it would seem she may have been telling us a bit of a porky.

"Yeah, I was lying," she says cheerily. "I lie all the time. I love the fact that a journalist asks: 'Are you planning a baby?' As if I'm going to go: 'Yes, I haven't told my mum yet, but I think I might come off the Pill.'

"But as you can see, I'm going to be having a pony. Well, it feels like a pony. My children want a penguin. But yes, I really wanted a third. I'd have ten if I was allowed. They fit in drawers. You don't need a lot of space."

Claudia, 39, may well be seven months pregnant with a pony, but that hasn't stopped her trooping to our studio where she leaps (sort of) on to a throne, takes the weight off and tells us about her new show King Of. The Channel 4 programme sees her harrying celebrities like Miranda Hart and Sarah Millican to passionately debate and crown everything from King of Nuts to King of Roast Dinners.

It's billed as a chat show but really it's more of a dinner party/pub debate.

"It's a game I've played for years with my husband, my family and my friends," Claudia says. "What's the King of Roasts, for instance? And don't say lamb. Each category will be debated by two guests and the studio audience, and it will be a very heated discussion."

She insists this is not a place for frothy showbiz chit-chat or even light-hearted joshing, and says she's already come down hard on new pal Miranda Hart.

"I don't give a stuff about these people other than their view on the King of Vegetables. If they don't care, I can't talk to them!" she exclaims. "It's very serious. I did the pilot with Miranda and she was laughing as we played King of Nuts. I said: 'No more laughter, Hart. I'm bringing out the walnut.' I have a torch that I shine on each item.

"But this is not for fun. This is not even really for telly. It is just so that I can write each answer after it has been thoroughly debated in a small red booklet that I'm going to leave to my children [Jake, eight, and Matilda, five]. They will have the definitive Kings Of. That's very, very important."

The latest addition to Claudia's brood announced its arrival last November when Claudia's body seemed to have something to tell her...

"When you wake up, get out of bed and are sick in your shoes every day you know," she says. "It was towards the end of the last series of It Takes Two."

Ah, It Takes Two. For many diehard Strictly Come Dancing fans, it's the early evening, five-times-a-week jewel in the crown of the BBC's





flagship show. Intended as the go-to place for expert dance analysis on each season's runners and riders, thanks to Claudia it's become a hilariously freewheeling chat show with The Winkle engaging, in her own inimitable style, with anyone and everyone who has an interest in Strictly. It's where you go to see author Marian Keves stalking her favourite professional dancer Lilia Kopylova with a digicam, or Peter Andre, EastEnders' Cheryl Fergison and judge Craig Revel

Horwood weighing up the consequences of Ann Widdecombe in a harness ("We can only hope that the harness fails and she doesn't get out of it, dahling," from Craig).

For seven years, Claudia has made autumn's teatime telly a funnier place to be, honking with laughter as she replays that clip of Pamela Stephenson teetering then somehow styling it out with her salsa, or testing Len Goodman's patience with her own Bambi-on-ice-like attempts at the

paso doble with the longsuffering (but clearly adoring it) head judge. But now there's a pony on the way and, imaginary kittens aside, the cat's out the bag.

"Yes. I'm not going to be doing It Takes Two this year," she sighs. "I can't believe I won't be doing it but there's just no way. My baby, knock on wood, will be six weeks old.

"I can't go to work every night. It's a physical impossibility. I love Strictly and It Takes Two more than life itself, so I feel totally

miserable about it. I kept saying: 'There must be a way. What if I bring the baby with me?' But my husband [Kris Thykier, 39] was like: 'Claud, you've got to sit this one out."

She's hoping that there's some way she can stay involved with the rest of the show, though.

"Maybe I can still do the Sunday show with Tess Daly," she says. "But It Takes Two won't be a sadder place without me. They'll get somebody brilliant. I'm also excited about watching it. I'll watch it every single night while breastfeeding the pony. It's such a great show. The bosses just let me do whatever I wanted. They used to turn up, give me a muffin and say: 'Off you go."

Maybe it's not surprising Claudia wants to devote more time to her family - she certainly appears to be happy on the home front these days. There were reports that she and movie-producer husband Kris hit a rocky patch a couple of years ago, which was blamed on work commitments. "Lots of people have ups and downs and we had a down," she told us then.

"Yes, we're on an up," she says now. "It's all good. I feel brilliant. That is all."

Her devotion and loyalty to Kris are apparent when we talk film, a lifelong passion of hers and the source of her dream job now that she hosts Film 2011. If Kris was to make a really rubbish movie (he produced the great Kick-Ass and is also behind Madonna's forthcoming Wallis Simpson film, W.E.) how would she review it?


