

Cosmo asks some of Britain's finest to tell us how they cope on the front line in the armed forces

hey're in the news every day

but what's life really like for
the men who fight for our
country? And how does it affect
their relationships? This month, our
four men are in the British Army, and
have served in Iraq, Northern Ireland
and Afghanistan. All in their late twenties
or early thirties, two are married, one's
separated and one's single. They are
currently stationed in Dorset.

What do you miss most when you're away?

Gareth*: "My family. I've been married for five years."

Dan: "My fiancée – there can be two or three weeks between each visit."

Aaron: "My brothers and sisters, nieces and nephews. I miss having my own time, too."

Gareth: "Privacy. You have to share a room with someone, and there's always someone else in the communal shower."

Tom: "I miss going down the pub. At home, if you've had a stressful day you can have a couple of pints and wind down. But when you're on tour you haven't got that option."

Aaron: "You miss the simple creature comforts, like having fresh milk in your tea."

Gareth: "When I'm away from home I even miss being nagged at!"

What keeps you going?

Tom: "Letters are like gold dust, even if they're just about a rainy day."

Aaron: "They're much better than emails.

Someone's taken the trouble to write it."

Gareth: "My wife wrote me one in a spiral.

You had to keep turning the page to read it. It took me half an hour but it was great."
